Renewing Our Civil Society Ethical Reasoning in Action

s an undergraduate, Sara Greco ('16) studied the impact of a simulated disaster scenario on ethical reasoning confidence and skills. Now a registered nurse practicing in Connecticut, she is also the lead author of an article based on her research with JMU faculty co-authors Erica Lewis, Julie Sanford, Erika Metzler Sawin and Allison Ames, in press with the peer-reviewed Journal of Professional Nursing. Ethical reasoning is fundamental to Greco's profession, she points out, as nurses are compelled to act in the best interest of their patients. Her research explored the complexity of determining what, exactly, those actions should be in a high-stress, high-stakes situation and how JMU's proprietary "Eight Key Questions" strategy serves to equip nurses for this kind of decision making.

he idea for BarTrack started in COB 300 and became a full-blown business within the summer venture accelerator, which is a vital part of JMU's entrepreneurship initiative. A student group devised a sensor-enabled beer tap with an integrated software package that helps more precisely regulate the amount dispensed, significantly reducing spillage and shrinkage – and therefore proprietors' revenue loss - every time. Since graduation, co-founders Brett Danielson ('18) and Hunter Markle ('18) have honed their business model, prototyping a functioning tap and premiering their product in a few businesses that now enjoy the "perfect pour." Expect more successful ventures to come out of JMU, as our Center for Entrepreneurship recently received the largest commitment in the university's history, naming the center in honor of leader and philanthropist Leslie Flanary Gilliam ('82).

He hadn't considered attending college before his stepmom told him about Valley Scholars, and in the past five years, the program has inspired and guided him to make JMU his college home for undergraduate studies.

Renewing Our Civil Society Honors College

n Professor Lori Britt's Introduction to Human Communications, students learn to solve sticky public problems by striving to understand others' viewpoints and values. Piloted in an honors section of a General Education class then made a required cohort class for all Honors College students, the course helps habituate an approach to complexity: learning, listening and questioning in the spirit of curiosity. Students challenge themselves to stay with the discussion and discovery, especially when they encounter people who think differently than they do. "We can't just say, 'If I can't solve it my way I'm going to walk away.' We don't have that luxury in the world," Britt says. "We have to solve these problems. We have to learn how to talk to each other."

Student Research

o assist the Montpelier Foundation in discovering the number and location of enslaved people buried at the estate, geophysicist and JMU professor Shane McGary enlisted the help of Michelle Proulx ('18), a geology major. They use ground-penetrating radar technology to sweep for clues, and since 2017 their project has revealed both forgotten cemeteries and individual gravesites. For McGary, their work offers a rare opportunity to help restore the humanity of an overlooked community, and Proulx has been especially pleased to share her student research with descendants of the people buried at James Madison's Montpelier. Although the pair cannot recover the names of those in dozens of unmarked graves, they are playing an important role in helping the historic site honor the lives of so many lost to time.

Building Our Success Makerspaces

hat happens when engineering and music intersect, when visionaries access the tools and collaborative makerspaces they need to innovate and create together? Just ask Stone Spring Elementary School's teachers and students who are reaping the rewards. JMU freshman engineering majors were challenged in a spring 2018 ENGR 112 course to collaborate with music education peers to develop instruments for children with atypical physical or mental abilities. In February, they consulted Stone Spring students, and by April the children had prototypes to play. That summer, JMU students brought the adaptive instruments idea to JMU's Leslie Flanary Gilliam Center for Entrepreneurship. There, they created a short-lived social venture that led to an exciting spin-off: Through a grant from the College of Visual and Performing Arts, music education major Sophie Harrison ('20) is taking adaptive music to the youth of the Bon Air Detention Center in Richmond.
